## Explore patient's needs and preferences

- This includes (but is not limited to) non-contraceptive benefits, tolerable and intolerable side-effects, affordability and effectiveness
- Raise awareness of the range of contraceptives, including long-acting reversible contraception (LARC; IUDs/implant), contraceptive injection, and the vaginal ring
- Include information about the method's risks, benefits, side-effect profile, cost and effectiveness


## Alternatives to NET pills

PBS LISTED

- Combined levonorgestrel (LNG) pills (similar side-effect profile to combined NET pills, likely to benefit acne, similar reduction in menstrual blood loss)
- LARC methods (LNG IUDs, implant) and contraceptive injection are effective, longerterm alternatives
- The progestogen only pill (mini-pill) Microlut in place of Noriday


## NON-PBS LISTED

- Combined pills - insufficient evidence to recommend one over another
- Vaginal ring
- Copper IUD


## Support the change

- Support the switch from a NET pill depending on safety, effectiveness, benefits, affordability and potential side-effects
- Provide advice on safe and effective contraceptive choices and explore compatibility with the patient's specific needs and preferences
- Consider non-contraceptive benefits including reduction in menstrual blood loss and acne control: A Cochrane review indicates no pill type is superior for acne
- Refer patients who show an interest in LARC to a LARC provider
